MY FAVORITE NATIVE PLANT



I first saw this native perennial on a garden tour in East Longmeadow MA and I couldn't wait to get home and look it up. The plant is ***Spigelia marilandica***, commonly known as **Indian Pink** for its pink roots. Its tubular flowers are bright red on the outside with yellow inner portions of the petals curling outward, forming a five pointed star at the top. The flower clusters grow on stiff stems up to 18 inches tall and slowly form clumps 14-18 inches wide. It likes

moist sandy soil or humus and will happily grow in partial shade. It can be found growing, in the wild, along streambeds and in low moist woods as far north as New Jersey but is hardy to zone 5 and has been doing well in my garden for the past 6 years. The plants bloom in June but are slow to come up in the spring, so make sure you mark them. It is easy to propagate from cuttings early in the growing season. Hummingbirds love Spigelia, which makes it worth growing in your home garden.

BLOODROOT, A HARBINGER OF SPRING

Bloodroot (*Sanguinaria Canadensis*) is a charming wildflower native to the woodlands of eastern North America. A favorite of early pollinators, this rhizomatous perennial forms colonies in moisture-retentive, well-drained soils in partial shade. Blossoms emerge on 6-inch stems in mid to late April and while the blooms are fleeting, attractive clusters of scalloped leaves up to a foot tall often persist into August. Seeds are spread by ants.
